CENTRIST PARTY STATEMENT ON FEDERAL JUST TRANSITION LEGISLATION October 9, 2023

There are many countries in the world which are still using coal as a source of energy, which leads to the highest greenhouse gas emissions. The world needs more energy due to increasing population and development, not only in the developing countries but also in Europe where the supply of natural gas has been threatened due to the Russia and Ukraine conflict.

The transition from fossil fuel energy to renewable energy can only be stepwise. Therefore, it is not wise to campaign against the natural resources of Canada including liquefied natural gas (LNG). The world needs LNG of Canada, the development of which is not only helpful to our economy but also to reduce the global greenhouse gas emissions.
